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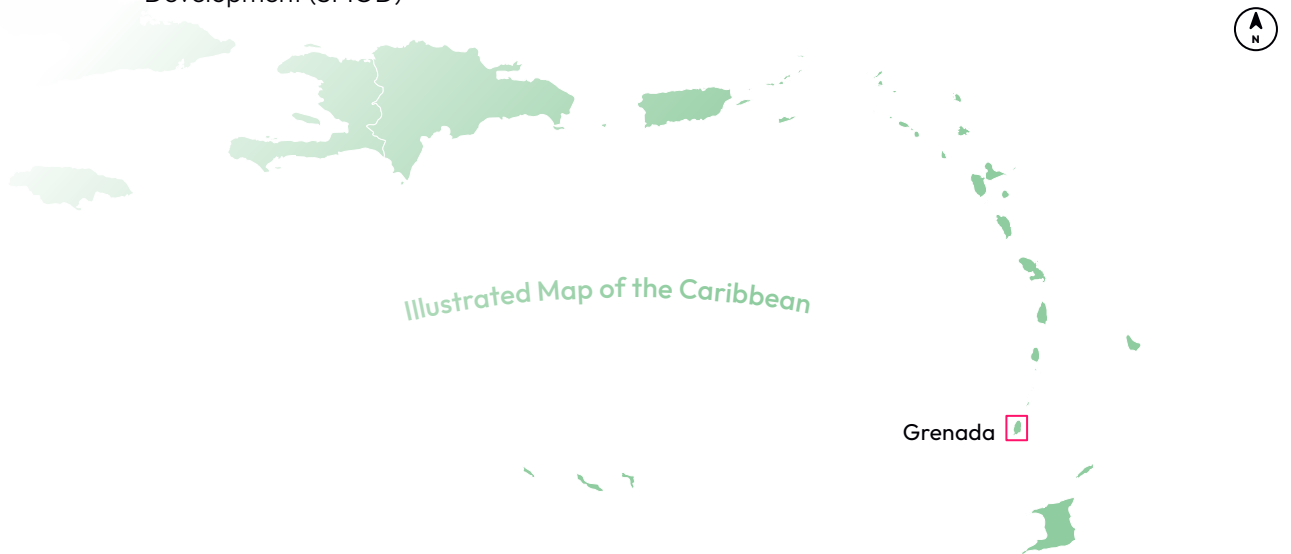

### PROJECT SUMMARY

This project strengthened the resilience and management of the proposed Gouyave Marine Protected Area (MPA) through community-led coral reef restoration and watershed interventions. A coral nursery program was expanded, with local volunteers trained to design and deploy BioRock™ structures and out-plant nursery-grown corals to rehabilitate degraded reefs.

Upstream, riparian assessments were conducted across three watersheds to identify degradation and pollution risks impacting the MPA. Institutional capacity was enhanced through updates to the MPA management plan, construction of a dedicated office, and targeted training for fishers and community members in sustainable practices.

## ACTIVITIES AND AREAS OF WORK

- **Fisheries and livelihoods:** Fishers trained in sustainable practices; seamanship and ranger training delivered; community trained in lionfish management as a livelihood option
- **Coral restoration:** Volunteers SCUBA-certified and trained in coral gardening; artificial reefs and 20+ nursery structures installed
- **Coastal and watershed management:** 1 ha of coastal habitat rehabilitated; riparian zones assessed and restored; community trained in rehabilitation practices
- **MPA development:** Office constructed; 30 moorings installed; zoning demarcated; management plan under review
- **Education and outreach:** School stewardship program expanded; community awareness campaigns and EbA training delivered; knowledge products developed
