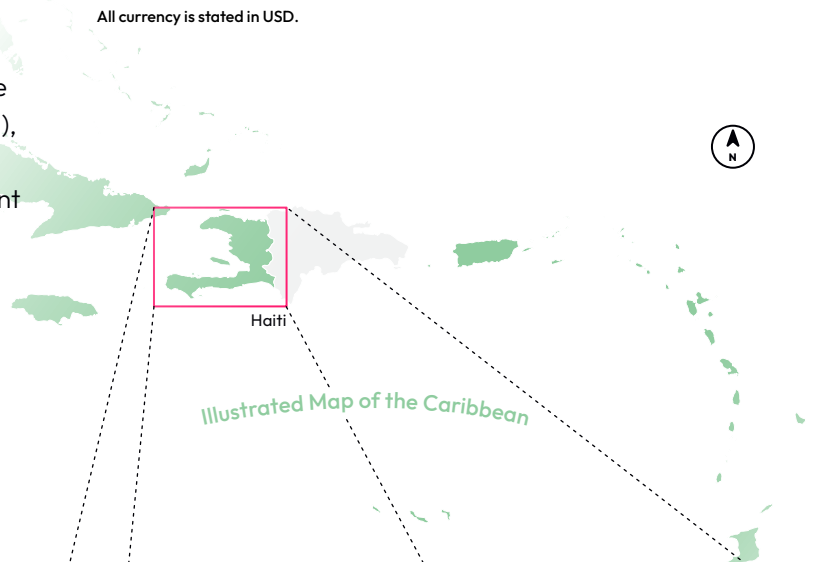

PROJECT SUMMARY

The Bondeau mangroves in Haiti face mounting pressure from deforestation, erosion, and unsustainable resource use within the Paillant-Bondeau watershed. This project protected these ecosystems through two complementary approaches. A ridge-to-reef (R2R) strategy supported agriculture and fisheries: farmers reforested upstream areas using moringa and other species under a Payment for Ecosystem Services (PES) scheme, reducing sedimentation and generating additional income, while coastal fishers received technical and organizational support, including establishment of a fishing cooperative. Parallel awareness-raising efforts built environmental stewardship among communities, schools, civil society, and government actors, strengthening governance of natural resources and long-term ecosystem resilience.

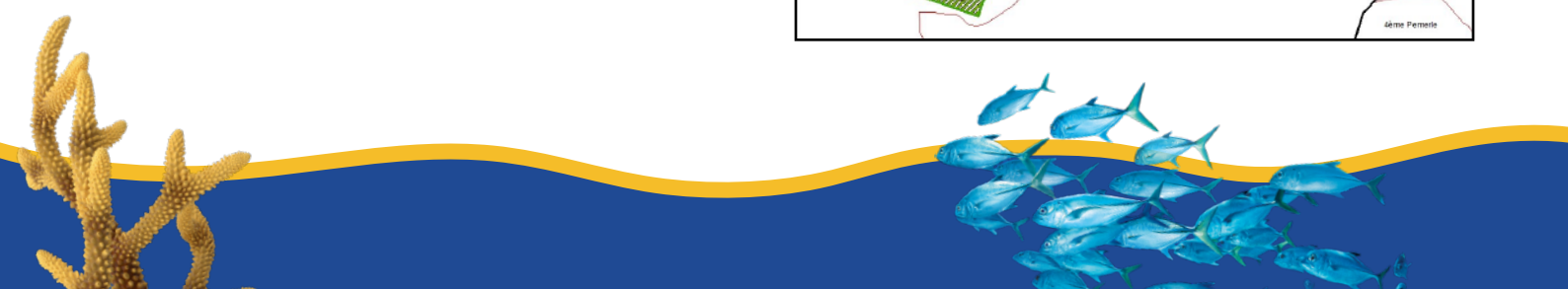
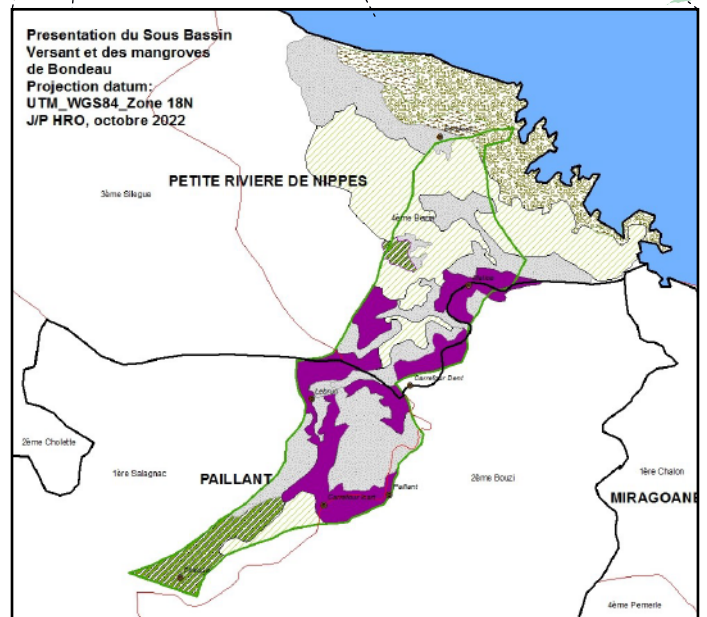

ACTIVITIES AND AREAS OF WORK

- Establish ridge-to-reef greenbelts to reduce erosion, restore soils, and support reforestation
- Develop a climate-smart moringa value chain
- Form a fishers' cooperative to share resources and strengthen collaboration
- Integrate local stakeholders into national fisheries and protected area frameworks
- Establish youth environment clubs to promote stewardship
