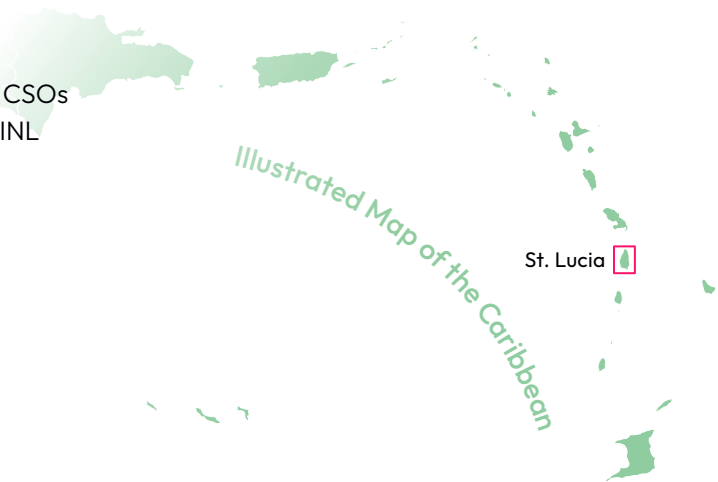

PROJECT SUMMARY

This project strengthened the climate resilience of coastal ecosystems within the Pointe Sable Environmental Protection Area (PSEPA) and Pigeon Island National Landmark (PINL) through improved ecosystem management and coastal stabilization. Participatory mangrove and reef assessments evaluated ecosystem health, function, economic value, and anthropogenic impacts, informing targeted interventions including demarcation, habitat restoration, and management plan development. Assessment findings also guided regulatory recommendations for sustainable resource use and coastal protection. Ecosystem valuations and capacity-building training empowered resource users and communities to contribute to restoration, install green infrastructure, maintain grey infrastructure, and pursue sustainable livelihoods — collectively enhancing the performance and resilience of hybrid climate adaptation systems.
